What is poverty?


 "Persons with income less than that deemed sufficient to purchase basic needs-food, shelter, clothing, and other essentials."





- Mother treated violently
- Household substance abuse
- Household mental illness
- Parental separation or divorce
- Incarcerated household member

How does poverty come into play?

Beginning kindergartners' school readiness skills by socioeconomic status (SES)

School-readiness skill	Lowest SES	Highest SES
Recognizes letters of the alphabet	39%	85%
Identifies beginning sounds of words	10%	51%
Counts to twenty	48%	68%
Identifies primary colors	69%	90%
Writes own name	54%	76%
Amount of time read to prior to kindergarten	25 hours	1,000 hours
Accumulated experience with words	13 million	45 million


